We have an extensive project for trapping to improve wildlife especially (birds and reptiles) and restore native forest and fauna. call that of Hine Ruru.



Founded in 1974 by Reverend Clementina Gordon, Saint Isaac's was established in 1982 as an Ecumenical Christian Trust with both the Anglican and Catholic Bishops of Auckland appointing a trustee, Taha Maori is also represented.

Clem left a challenging legacy. Saint Isaac's strives to be at the still centre where you can find peace and tranquility and where the life of prayer for a suffering world finds expression in the 21st century.

There have been many large-hearted people over the years who have served either as Trustee or Kaitiaki. We give thanks to past and present servants of God called to St. Isaac's, for their manaakitanga/care of land and people, their prayer, silence and wairuatanga/spirtuality.

SAINT ISAAC'S is a place of prayer overlooking Hokianga – nui – a – Kupe.

Christ so often searched out a quiet place in whenua/nature and many of his followers have continued this search. Still today, this is the pattern of contemplative prayer in the church and in its deepest sense, the pattern of Saint Isaac's Retreat House.

Morning and Evening prayer are said daily in the chapel and you are welcome to join us at 9.30am and 5.30pm (5.00pm winter).

Following the church lectionary, reading scripture, reciting psalms along with the ancient prayers of the Church in both English and Te Reo.

The prayers of the church are centred on Christ, and always looks towards his sacramental presence in the Eucharist (Holy Communion), which is celebrated on Wednesdays at 9.30am.

This rhythm of prayer alongside our ministry of hospitality welcomes individuals, or groups up to seven to come and join us in the richness of this simple prayer-lifestyle.



The Library, adjacent to the chapel is a place to linger with

writings from the early church fathers, medieval mystics,

modern and contemporary religious writers. Whether you

want to dive into church history, biblical studies, feminist

theology, liturgy, poetry, art history or just enjoy a novel.
